



As of when this data was collected, students who enrolled in 2016/17 who undertook a re-sit and did not pass would be yet to undertake their second re-sit, meaning these students could not have yet failed the course.




2. A. 2. 2. BPTC results obtained by full-time students (grades of BPTC graduates only): students from all domiciles




2. A. 3. Percentage of enrolled full-time students who have completed the BPTC as of summer 2017: students from all domiciles


































2. B. 5. Ranking of university at which full-time BPTC students studied for first degree: students from all domiciles
